Playboy fantasies and whopping anatomies as Takashi Murakami saturates Gagosian Gallery

Murakami is known for his "superflat" style, merging traditional painting techniques with animated elements His newest paintings, though, take an already-controversial legacy and douses it in new patterns and imagery.

Exhibition: Takashi Murakami, Gagosian Gallery, London, until August 5 2011

Tokyo artist Takashi Murakami pours a cauldron of saucy satire over his sleazy ventures into fine art.

His first gift to the world, 1997's Miss Ko2, made a life-size sculpture into an ebullient playboy fantasy with a manga twist, and Nurse Ko2, his more recent statue, boasts "busty verticality", a sexy uniform and a "suggestively-loaded syringe".

The ability of his 3-Meter Girl to support herself is threatened by "whopping pendular breasts", and elsewhere there are highly-polished metal penises and vaginas and graphic depictions of exaggerated genitals.

Kuroda Seiki, an exponent of Western-style painting in the late 19th and early 20th centuries, shocked with his propensity for rendering nudes, so Murakami promptly takes his best-known triptych, Wisdom, Impressionism, Sentiment, and applies gold and silver-leafing and elements of manga to it.

If his imagination is juvenile, the results are always absurd and addictive.
