More Gagosian

Two spaces in Chelsea — the better part of three floors at 980 Madison Avenue and, next door, a bookshop and small gallery — would seem like a surfeit of real estate to most dealers, but not Larry Gagosian. Yet another Gagosian gallery is about to open nearby, making a total of 14 worldwide.

It will be in a quirky ground floor space at 821 Park Avenue, at 75th Street. "I wasn't looking for another space, but I drove by it a few times this winter when it was too cold to walk to work, and I saw a sign in the window that it was available," Mr. Gagosian said. "I loved the fact that it's small and isolated on Park Avenue where there's no other retail. That's what made it compelling to me."

The first show there, which will run from the space's opening on April 3 through May 8, will feature sculptures by the Swiss artist Urs Fischer. Called "Last Supper," it will offer new casts of original clay works shown at the Museum of Contemporary Art in Los Angeles last year.

But that's not all. Mr. Gagosian will also be running a pop-up gallery, also opening April 3, at 104 Delancey Street on the Lower East Side, in a former Chase bank branch. There, he will show 20 other new sculptures by Mr. Fischer. The pop-up gallery show will run through May 23.
